New Exhibit on Birding in Lackawanna County (Penn.) Opens February 1, 2008 at Scranton's Everhart Museum

Scranton – January 21, 2008: Lackawanna County (Penn.) boasts many enthusiastic birders and scientists who study and research resident and migratory birds in the region. *In the Field: Birding & Research in Lackawanna County*, opening on February 1st at the Everhart Museum of Natural History, Science & Art, and continuing on display through March 31, 2008, illustrates the efforts of these birding volunteers who observe and count the various types of birds found in Northeastern Pennsylvania, as well as the data and studies of scientific researchers in tracking the habits and health of the birds and their local ecological niches.

Local birding enthusiasts, including members of the Lackawanna Audubon Society such as Lisa and Paul Mundy, lend their photos and data sheets for counting birds as part of the exhibit. Local biology professors, Michael Carey and Robert Smith from the University of Scranton, present their years-long research and data from bird-banding and studying various species of resident and migratory birds stopping over at Lackawanna State Park in Lackawanna County.

In the Field complements the exhibit Flocks & Feathers: Birds in Science, Culture and Art, which highlights the Everhart Museum's bird specimens from around the world, alongside cultural objects that use feathers or depict birds, as well as contemporary art inspired by avian creatures. These bird-themed exhibits are inspired by the Museum's founder, Dr. Isaiah Fawkes Everhart, who possessed a life-long interest in the study of birds (ornithology) and was an amateur taxidermist. It was in 1908 that Dr. Everhart donated more than 2,000 bird specimens to create the Museum's first exhibits. It is therefore fitting that the first exhibit of the Museum's Centennial Year goes back to its foundation: the birds.

The Everhart Museum is open: noon-4:00 p.m. Thursday, Friday and Monday; 10:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m. on Saturday; and noon-5:00 p.m. on Sunday. Admission is \$5/adults, \$3/students & seniors, \$2/children 6-12, and free to Everhart Museum members.
