The Everhart presents Bold Independence: African American Quilts from the Collection of David Whaley, on view now through June 6, 2022. Every Stitch Counts: Works from the Social Justice Sewing Academy, on view now through December 27, 2021.

*Bold Independence* features quilts made during the second half of the 20th century by eleven African American women from Mississippi and Alabama. A number of the works are by the famous Gee's Bend quilters and a majority were produced in the Black Belt region of Central Alabama and Mississippi.

Developed by the Everhart Museum in conjunction with the Social Justice Sewing Academy (SJSA), *Every Stitch Counts* features textiles created by either individual youth artists or workshop participants. The program, supported by the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts (PCA) through the Everhart's and PCA's Folk and Traditional Arts Partnership, promotes and celebrates the diverse heritage of the region by connecting artists to the community. Edwards brings with her experience in education through her previous position as a teaching artist for AmeriCorps ArtistYear, partnering with Bayard Taylor Elementary in Philadelphia. There, she delivered an issue-based arts curriculum that supported the school's community and culture and brought artistry and positive messages to the district. "It brought me joy to touch students' lives, inspire staff, and leave a visible stamp on the school's community and culture," says Edwards.
