



## *Every Stitch Counts* and *Bold Independence* Now Through December 27



The Everhart is proud to present two superb textile exhibitions this fall, *Every Stitch Counts: Works from the Social Justice Sewing Academy* and *Bold Independence: African American Quilts from the Collection of David Whaley*, both of which are on view now through December 27, 2021.

Developed by the Everhart Museum in conjunction with the Social Justice Sewing Academy (SJSA), a national youth education program that bridges artistic expression with activism to advocate for social justice, *Every Stitch Counts* features textiles created by either individual artists or collectives highlighting social justice issues that have affected the artists, their families, and their communities. This exhibition is generously supported by PNC Bank.

*Bold Independence* features quilts made during the second half of the 20th century by eleven African American women from Mississippi and Alabama. A number of the works are by the famous Gee' s Bend quilters and a majority were produced in the Black Belt region of Central Alabama.

Fall 2021 Everhart Minis and Juniors Virtual Programs Begin October 16



From October 16 to November 13, Everhart Minis and Juniors virtual art classes will help students explore and understand their own identities through symbolism and portraiture by guiding them in the use of various types of media, such as drawing, painting, and mixed media, to create artwork. Due to the current situation regarding the COVID pandemic, the classes will be held virtually so that students can learn from the safety of their own homes.

Everhart Minis introduces students Grades K-3 to the art-making process, while Everhart Juniors is an advanced art course for students Grades 4-8. Both programs run for five weeks and include toolkits that provide students with the resources they need to work from home, as well as LIVE virtual instruction via Google Classroom. Live instruction takes place Saturdays from 10:00 a.m. to 11:30 p.m. for Minis and Saturdays from 12:00 p.m. to 11:30 p.m. for Juniors. Participation in Google Classroom sessions is optional as the toolkits will provide students with everything they need to work on their own.

Frank Littlebear Virtual Performance for Second Sunday Series October 10



Premiering on Sunday, October 10 at 2:00 p.m. on the Museum's <u>Facebook</u> page and <u>YouTube</u> channel, the Everhart's Second Sunday Folk and Traditional Arts Series welcomes Native American artist of Cree Nation ancestry Frank Littlebear to perform music, dance, and exhibit handcrafts in Native American tradition.

Inspired by his own family and Nation traditions and beliefs, Littlebear has spent several decades presenting interactive and immersive programs that bring to life the diverse social, traditional, and contemporary lifestyles of Indigenous people both past and present.

"My only hope is that my work continues to inspire others for generations to come. I wish only that my work plants a seed that others may find, to spark a flame in them that inspires them to share the art, music and culture of their own heritage," says Littlebear.

The Second Sunday series is made possible through

the Everhart's Folk and Traditional Arts Partnership with the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts. The goal of the program is to sustain the cultural and artistic practices rooted in the histories, traditions, and everyday lives of people in Lackawanna, Luzerne, Pike, Susquehanna, Wayne and Wyoming counties.
