115 YEARS OF NATURAL HISTORY, SCIENCE & ART

An avid naturalist and taxidermist, Dr. Everhart donated the initial collection of his own birds, mammals, and other wildlife to the institution, which primarily focused on natural history in the early years.

The initial Beaux Arts style building was much smaller than the one that exists today. In 1929, in order to encompass a growing collection that included a substantial arts component, the Everhart was given two wings and an art deco facade, yielding to the appearance it has had for nearly a century.

Throughout the 20th century, the Museum's focus has expanded to local, regional, and global art and cultural artifacts. Much of the collection documents and preserves Northeastern Pennsylvania's unique cultural and natural heritage, including the region's anthracite coal history, which is represented in the Museum's rock and mineral, fossil, and art collections

While collecting and exhibiting the work of artists of national and international renown, the Museum has always promoted the artistic talent inherent in Northeastern Pennsylvania, showing works by prominent artists like Impressionist John Willard Raught (1857–1931) of Dunmore, PA; silkscreen artist,



watercolorist, and oil painter Jon Carsman (1943–1987) of Wilkes-Barre, PA; and Realist Hope Horn (1920–2001) of Scranton, PA.

Since 1908, the Everhart has enriched, inspired, and educated generations of people throughout the region and beyond. In addition to caring for and exhibiting the collections, the Museum provides educational and interpretive programs for all ages. With a multidisciplinary and inclusive approach, the Everhart creates extraordinary experiences, stimulating learning, creative expression, and active engagement in the arts and sciences.

2022 IN REVIEW


In 2022, the Museum opened special exhibitions celebrating two Wilkes-Barre-based artists in The Reader: Paintings by Travis Prince and Changing Frequencies: Works by Jon Carsman.

Another ongoing exhibition that opened is *In Full Bloom: Flowers* of the Everhart, which showcases the essence of flowers as represented in painting, drawing, and sculpture; encapsulated in photography; and occurring in nature.

The Museum's Rakin' in the Fun and Snow Much Fun fall and winter community days, made possible by the Overlook Estate Foundation, brought in hundreds of members of our community for free admission, activities, and entertainment in the fall and winter, as did In Full Bloom: Free Admission Day in August.

In December, the Museum hosted a *Planned Giving Tea event*, the first of many planned giving events to come, featuring a presentation by Attorney Kevin R. Grebas, Esquire, CELA.









REGIONAL IMPACT

The Everhart Museum has been a part of the cultural landscape of Northeastern Pennsylvania since 1908, bringing together communities across the region through exhibitions, programs, and events.

The Everhart is constantly enhancing its connection to counties surrounding Lackawanna County in several ways. Educational toolkits are provided to classrooms throughout Northeastern Pennsylvania for free through the Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) program. Off-site workshops and onsite guided tours are offered to schools and other educational institutions throughout the region. Since 2018, the Everhart has served its 15-county area in hosting the annual *Scholastic Art Awards* for Northeastern Pennsylvania, which showcases the work of high school artists in the region. In 2023, the Museum received over 400 submissions from 41 schools in the region.

Meanwhile, exhibitions and galleries celebrate the region's rich cultural heritage, from a new installation of Dorflinger Glass made in White Mills, PA in Wayne County, to vivid silkscreens created by Jon Carsman,



a native of Wilkes-Barre, PA in Luzerne County, in the exhibition *Changing Frequencies: Works by Jon Carsman.* Much of Northeastern Pennsylvania's history is encapsulated in art, cultural artifacts, and ephemera. Rocks, minerals, fossils, and taxidermied animals represent the spectrum of the natural specimens to be found throughout the region, many of which being unique to the local counties in which they were collected.

It is the goal of the Everhart to help people connect with and know more about the rich past and present of the region in which they live, all while preparing for a vibrant future.

2023 YEAR TO COME

Throughout 2023, the theme of *Everhart 115* runs through exhibitions, events, and educational programs. The Museum has a busy and exciting year ahead, and we look forward to welcoming our community to join us in the fun!

EXHIBITIONS

Changing Frequencies: Works by Jon Carsman

November 18, 2022-Spring 2023

Featuring selections from the Everhart's collection, Changing Frequencies: Works by Jon Carsman highlights Wilkes-Barre, PA native Jon Carsman's (1944–1987) distinctive silkscreens as well as his acrylic, pen, and watercolor works and is open through spring 2023.

Works on Paper Gallery

February 2, 2023-Ongoing

New in 2023, the Works on Paper Gallery is a semi-permanent regularly-changing gallery of ink sketches, charcoal drawings, engravings, etches, photographs, and more from the Everhart's holdings.

Women in Art

March 2, 2023-Summer 2023

In partnership with WVIA Public Media, the Everhart celebrates Women's History Month in March with Women in Art, which highlights the work depicting and by women from the Everhart's collections. The exhibition continues through summer 2023.

Everhart Founder's Gallery

May 18, 2023-Ongoing

Opening May 18 in celebration of the Museum's 115th anniversary, the semi-permanent Everhart Founder's Gallery examines the life and work of Isaiah Fawkes Everhart (1840–1911), the medical doctor, Civil War veteran, and naturalist who founded the Everhart Museum in 1908.

Wild Bees

June 8, 2023-September 17, 2023

Wild Bees, an exhibition of work by photojournalist and writer Paula Sharp and photographer Ross Eatman, showcases colorful high resolution photographs of bees in their natural habitats. Beekeeping wares from the Everhart collection are included and a variety of educational programs will be offered.

Coal Exhibition

Summer 2023-Fall 2023

From June through summer 2023, in conjunction with the reopening to the public of the Brooks Mine in Nay Aug Park, the Coal Exhibition explores the region's coal history through art, coal mining tools and wares, and natural specimens.

Folk Art Gallery


September 28, 2023-Ongoing

















Changing Frequencies



EVENTS

May 2023 marks the 115th anniversary of the Everhart Museum.

The Museum celebrates the occasion with *Everhart 115* Community Day on May 20, a day of free admission, entertainment, and activities inside and outside of the Museum. The day also highlights the opening of the Everhart Founder's Gallery on May 18.

Throughout 2023, the Museum continues its Community Day events, which all include free admission, activities, and entertainment, with the return of *Rakin'* in the Fun in October and *Snow Much Fun* in December.

This coming year sees the return of the Everhart's large outdoor fundraisers. The *Gaelic Gathering event* on July 14 invites the community to enjoy food, drink, and live entertainment in Irish traditions.

On September 30, the Museum hosts *Night* in the *Vineyard*, a dinner and wine event featuring award-winning wine writer and sommelier Kevin Zraly.

There are also planned quarterly giving events, each with a special theme. Events are slated for March, June, and September.



PROGRAMS

For 2023, the Museum has introduced its Monthly Family Workshop series based on monthly observances.


In each session, a special guest instructor leads participants in a themed art or craft while discussing the importance of that month's topic. This workshop series is made possible through the support of the Overlook Estate Foundation.

The Museum continues its *Museum Adventure Toolkit* program for public schools throughout
Northeastern Pennsylvania in 2023, made possible
through the PA Educational Improvement Tax Credit
program. The free Toolkits included instructions,
materials, live demonstrations, and more.

This summer, the annual Museum Adventure Weeks program returns in July and August. The two, five-day long programs include Nature Adventure Week: Eco Exploration and Art Adventure Week: Where Imagination Takes Flight.

For Nature Adventure Week, campers explore how plants and animals are connected in a delicate balance. Projects include gardening, plant pressing, nature painting, and more as campers learn inside the Museum and outside in Nay Aug Park.

During Art Adventure Week, campers work with a variety of materials and techniques, including paint, clay, printmaking, drawing, and more to push the boundaries of their creativity.

The two came as a "package deal," as they like to say, in 2013. Long-time friends from their years as teachers in the Scranton School District, they joined the Everhart in their retirements as a way to continue working with children.

When they began in March 2013 to prepare for that year's *Museum Adventure Weeks* summer camp, they were immediately drawn into the culture of the Museum. "I never expected to become so involved," MaryAnn admits. From school tours, to community events, to workshops, they have done it all.

"The Everhart Museum is a wonderful place full of interesting things," says Cathy, who recalls fondly visiting the Museum as a child herself. "I think it is extremely important for our young people to have the opportunity to explore all the Museum has to offer. Children learn so much better if they 'experience' something first-hand...We are opening new worlds for some of these students."

MaryAnn recognizes the importance of the community in sustaining the Museum so that it can serve as a bastion of natural history, science and art for generations to come. "The staff, the volunteers, the school children, the visitors, new and old, all keep the Everhart alive...It is wonderful to be part of something that will be here long after I am gone."

ADVENTURE at the EVERHART

For the summer and fall of 2022, the Museum provided over 600 free Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) Adventure Toolkits to classrooms Grades 1–5, throughout Northeastern Pennsylvania. The Toolkits included step-by-step instructions, materials, access codes for live virtual demonstrations, and more. Thank you to all local businesses that contributed!

During the summer, the Museum continued its annual tradition of *Museum Adventure Weeks*. This summer program, offered virtually in 2022 (and to be offered in person in 2023), featured two week-long sessions and allowed students Grades 1–5 to explore themes of natural history, science, and art through hands-on activities, virtual tours, and live demonstrations.

The Museum also hosted several painting workshops and demonstrations in the fall with featured artist Travis Prince, including a still life painting workshop in November and a presentation for the Marywood University STARS program.
