Flowers, Forms, and Fluctuations: Abstract Photography by Bruce Checefsky on View at Everhart Museum May 16–August 29

Scranton, PA - *Flowers, Forms, and Fluctuations: Abstract Photography by Bruce Checefsky,* on view at Everhart Museum May 16–August 29, showcases the work of the photographer and artist from Peckville, PA. Featuring photographs taken by scanner of colorful flowers shot in the artist's garden, this exhibition invites viewers to see nature in a unique way.

While scanners are typically intended to reproduce images in an exact manner, Cheshefsky's technique of recording images from afar via scanner produces results reminiscent of science-fiction landscapes. His productions are random, unique, and singular, and even he never knows quite what will be produced.

"I discovered the process of using the scanner as a camera when, one night, while my jet-black cat, Nadja, was sitting next to me, I placed her on the scanner glass," says Checefsky. "She climbed off and wanted nothing to do with my prank... I tilted the scanner toward her and ran the program...The resulting image was bewilderingly beautiful."

Now, along with his wife, Tina, he plants flowers in his garden for the sole purpose of scanning them in this manner. "Our garden has become an art project, as seen here in this exhibition of prints," he says.
